Using a and an

Learning when to use a and an may be one of the first spelling rules students learn. However, even in the upper grades, students do not always remember the rule for when to use these words. Many students have not internalized the correct sound pattern of using an before words that begin with a vowel or a vowel sound.

- 1. Identify the vowels. Write *a*, *e*, *i*, *o*, and *u* on the board. Remind students that all the other letters of the alphabet are consonants.
- 2. Now write two rows of vowels and add the *r*-controlled vowel symbols (see below) in the third row. (Refer to Louisa C. Moats's English Vowel Chart in her book, *LETRS: Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling*, 2003, Module 2, page 98, for a complete visual of all the vowel sounds.)



- 3. Explain the rule: Use **an** before words beginning with a vowel or a vowel sound. Tell students: Pay careful attention to the initial sound. Sometimes a word begins with a vowel and makes a consonant sound and vice versa.
- 4. Draw breve marks (*) above the first row of vowels. Review the short vowel sounds and use a few examples to demonstrate the rule (e.g., an **apple**, an **igloo**).
- 5. Draw macrons (-) above the second row of vowels and review the long vowel sounds. Explain to students that there is no long *u* vowel sound. Long *u* is the consonant sound of *y* /y/ followed by /oo/. If a word begins with the letter *u* and it makes a long *u* sound, it is preceded by the word *a*, not the word *an*.
- 6. Write the words *university*, *uniform*, and *used* on the board. Have students pronounce them and write each in a sentence, using both *a* and *an* as articles. Emphasize the consonant *y* /*y*/ sound at the beginning followed by /oo/, and how these words flow better when preceded with the article *a*. Tell students that words beginning with the letter *u* have a consonant *y* /*y*/ sound followed by /oo/. These words follow the rule and are preceded by the word *a*.
