How to Determine the Child's Developmental Reading Stage

Listen to children read. Have them tell you about their reading. Look at their writing. If they already know how to do everything in one column, move to the column to the right until you have found their developmental reading stage. That is where you will work with them in small group.

	 Listen and comprehend stories and informational text Speak in sentences with expanding vocabulary Label pictures, make lists, write one to three short sentences about something they know 	 Understand story elements and central ideas when reading Retell what they read Read more fluently Use new vocabulary as they listen to and read text Speak in longer, more complex sentences Write stories, information, and poems that are short 	 Read and comprehend a wider variety of genres (folktales, fables, stories, biographies) Use text features to understand informational text and identify central ideas Read and pay attention to meanings of new words Write more extended pieces (fiction, nonfiction, poems) 	 Understand more complex plots with numerous episodes and changes in setting Use text features and structures independently to comprehend more deeply Read with increasing fluency both orally and silently Write more complex pieces for a variety of authentic purposes
