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EXAMPLES OF CO-CONSTRUCTED LEARNING PARTNER SUCCESS CRITERIA

How to be a great talk partner (age six)

- No moaning or sulking
- Sit close together and face each other
- Speak clearly
- Look at your partner when he or she speaks
- Speak slowly

Our learning partner success criteria (age nine)

- Listen to my partner's advice and use it in my learning
- Leave other learning partners alone
- Take shared responsibility for our learning
- Take turns and don't interrupt
- Help my partner by offering suggestions
- Understand that my partner might not agree with me
- Share my ideas with my partner
- Hearing is waiting for a gap so you can speak listening is being able to let go of what you want to say and instead listening to what is being said

Ground rules for learning partners (age fifteen)

- Track the speaker
- Convey your voice
- Listen and take turns.
 Don't talk over each other
- Disagree politely
- Keep an open mind
- Use persuasive arguments to express your opinion
- Encourage each other
- Share responsibility for learning
- Respect each other
- Develop your communication
- Inspire each other
- Don't give answers—guide instead
